Poor Baby by Sarah Bernstein

A remaking of the Gothic haunted by the spectres of complicity and inheritance by the Booker Prize-shortlisted author of *Study for Obedience*

Westermoy is an old gamekeeper's cottage, lived in by a succession of estate managers, and the narrator and her partner, Emil, are its newest occupants. Emil is overseeing an ambitious regeneration project on the estate, and she is employed as a gardener: pruning, watering, mulching, pickling, despatching the rhododendrons. The narrator is baffled with grief, but she is working to be well. And soon after she moves in to Westermoy, she discovers she is pregnant. But even from the first happy evening of their arrival, there are spaces in Westermoy where she does not like to tread.

Emil is taken away suddenly by the estate's owner on business, and almost as soon as he leaves, letters begin to appear at Westermoy from a mysterious clerk – strange intimations about the estate, thickets of claim and counterclaim, recompense and reparation, in respect of the alleged illegal occupation of the premises; boundary disputes; reports of unedifying confrontations on the ground. Why do the letters, which cannot after all be meant for either of them, feel personal? Why do they make her so nervous?

She has made it nearly to the end of the pregnancy when a thick cream envelope arrives embossed with her and Emil's names. Inside is an invitation to the big house. Something, something is waiting for her...

When Paula, a charismatic urban ecologist comes into her life, Iris feels an awakening and begins to project herself more confidently into the future. But the pull of the city is still there, a city whose history and architecture come to act as a mirror of the tremors in her body and in her mind.

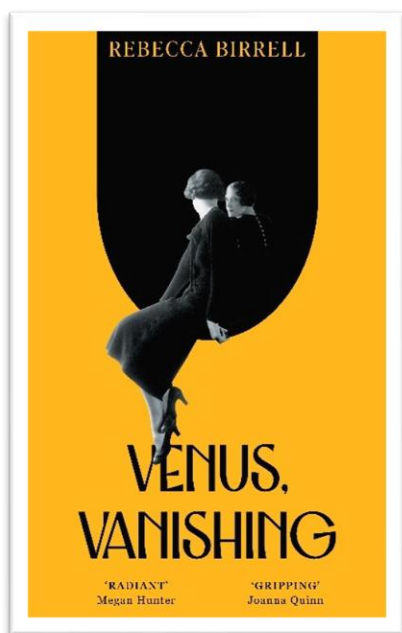

Taking place over a long, hot weekend, this stylish tragi-comedy follows a small family's chaotic preparations for a funeral. With echoes of Edward St. Aubyn's Patrick Melrose novels, *A Sense of Occasion* understands the potency, wretchedness, and wit of family gatherings.

Mary's death is bad news – for her daughter Patch, ex-partner Robin, and niece Jude.

It will mean a funeral. But Patch can barely keep track of her mother's journey from the hospital to the mortuary, let alone host a wake in her childhood home.

Robin wants to support her, but instead of assuming the role of responsible father, he heads to his former haunt: the lay-by where he used to meet farmers for sex.

Jude's on her way from Naples, worrying less about Patch, her estranged cousin, and more about whether there's a medicinal bag of cocaine in the boot. She hasn't told the family she's en route. This way, any lingering acrimony will be forgotten, and Jude's past behaviour will be forgiven.

Thrown together in Mary's tiny house, each of them is trying to feel something: to grieve, atone, join in, be better. But they rarely have one another's best interests at heart, and as the connections between them twist and contort, they lose sight of the rules and grasp towards anything that might make it all less painful.

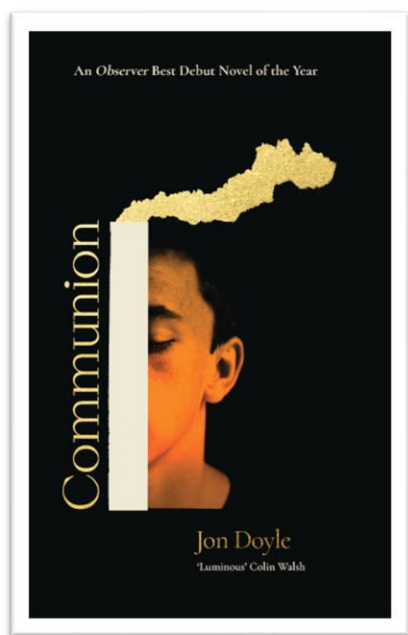

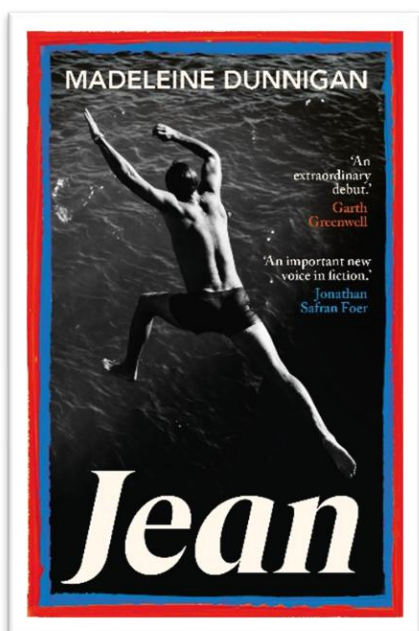

Farewell to Eden by Sebastian Faulks

He surrendered to the chaos, the lack of shape or meaning in his human life. He acknowledged the weight of unknowing, the smothering of ignorance that might as well be glossed as faith, because it was after all within the walls of a monastery that he had first thought himself blessed. As the last note sounded, he felt himself melt into the living spirits of those he had loved and of those who, even if he had not known it at the time, had loved him too.

Set after the second world war, *Farewell to Eden* opens with a man arriving to become a teacher at a girl's school in England. There are early hints that he is not quite who he seems, and that there are secrets in his past.

At that time, there had been trauma in so many people's lives. Slowly we learn that Philip was a peacekeeper in Palestine in the immediate aftermath of the War. As he spends long evenings with Frances, the enigmatic music mistress at the school, we come to know two people who can't talk about the traumatic experiences that they have barely survived.

After great suffering, can they retain their humanity and learn to love again?

A sudden death at the school threatens to upend their growing closeness and carefully reconstituted lives in a beautifully crafted novel about love and war and suffering and its aftermath. Ultimately, this profound and profoundly moving novel is about the search for faith and love and meaning in an embattled world.

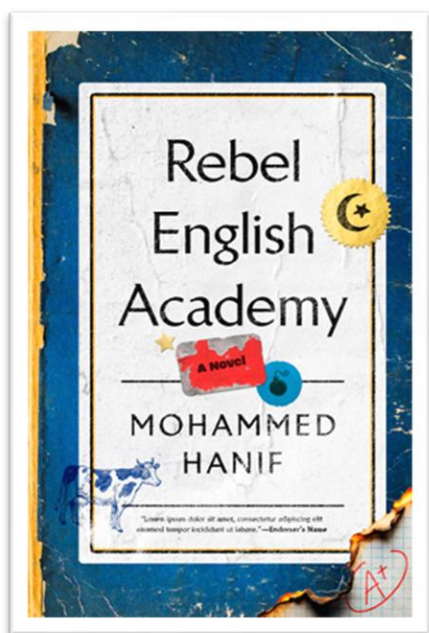

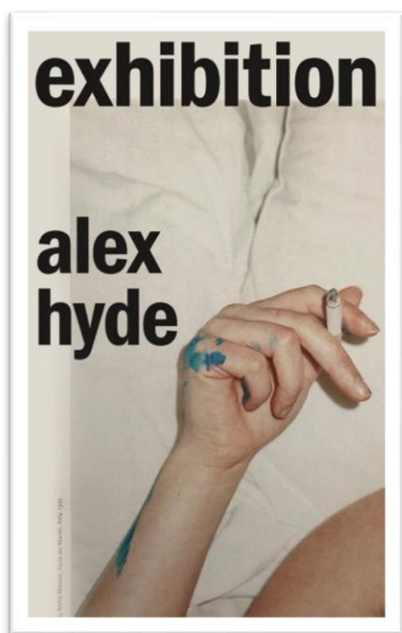
McParland spends two and a half years deep undercover, doing his best to weather whatever comes at him – the elements, the back-breaking work down the mines, the suspicions of people on all sides. But the deeper in he gets, the higher the stakes become, until the question is not so much will he get the story but whether he’ll survive to tell it.

RHYS DAVIES and **BEN KEITH** are international criminal law barristers. Between them they have appeared before the highest courts in England and Wales, the European Court of Human Rights, the International Criminal Court, the United Nations, and have represented former heads of state, governments, journalists, human rights defenders, and those targeted by politically motivated prosecutions across multiple jurisdictions, from China to the Middle East. They have written for *The Times*, *Economist*, *Guardian*, *Newsweek* and *Wall Street Journal*, and spoken about their work on the BBC, CNN, Al-Jazeera and CBS 60 Minutes. Together they founded Red Notice Monitor, an information hub on Interpol Red Notices, providing news, resources and advice.

Poisonings, kidnappings, show trials, men who vanish from airport lounges and are never seen again. These are not the plot devices of Cold War fiction but the working methods of modern statecraft. This is the age of transnational repression, where exile no longer means sanctuary, borders and legal jurisdiction are little more than inconveniences, and the institutions created after 1945 to protect the vulnerable have become weapons used by authoritarian governments.

Rhys Davies and Ben Keith are international criminal law barristers with decades of frontline experience: representing journalists and dissidents, businessmen caught in politically motivated prosecutions, Uighur activists in exile, families whose relatives have been rendered across borders. Their work has revealed over and over that the architecture of international cooperation has been turned against its purpose. Interpol red notices – the closest thing to an international arrest warrant, designed to catch fugitives – are now issued against journalists and human rights defenders; diplomatic immunity provides cover for murder; extradition treaties become instruments of persecution; authoritarian states establish covert police stations in other territories.

The Autocrat's Sniper Rifle tells the story of the new system of international law and of the people caught in its sights. Drawing on cases from their own practice as well as some of those that briefly had the world's attention, Davies and Keith show that as authoritarian regimes have grown more brazen in their actions, and more confident of impunity, so they have begun to disregard the law, or bend it to their will. And why wouldn't they, when the country that built the rules-based international order now seems intent on tearing it down. But while we have the institutions, we still have the machinery of a functioning system of international justice. The trajectory might only seem like it's headed one way, but the outcome is not yet decided. And that is enough to keep going.

The Narco Presidents

Tracing the Lines of Power, Money and Cocaine in the Americas

In June 1971, President Richard Nixon declared the ‘War on Drugs’. He called drug abuse “public enemy number one” in US society and vowed an “all-out offensive” on the production, sale, distribution and consumption of illegal narcotics. The policy would come to affect the US’s bilateral relationship with every nation in the Americas and its stance towards the entire region.

Over the last half century, much of Latin American life has been dominated by narcotics. Much attention is given to the cartels and the drug trafficking operations that see thousands of tonnes of cocaine, heroin and now, fentanyl make their way over the border to the US, and much less to the political systems that enable, or are corrupted by, it. As the cartels have grown in power and influence, the state has been corrupted, a corruption that finds its ultimate expression in the narco-president. Since Manuel Noriega’s reign in Panama in the 1980s, the narco-president has become increasingly common in the region, from Venezuela and Colombia to Honduras and Mexico.

In *The Narco Presidents*, Will Grant, the BBC’s Senior Correspondent in Latin America, explores this phenomenon. Following the journey the cocaine takes up Latin America to the US border, he investigates the links between drugs and executive power, and the various bargains that are made in order to entrench both. Drawing on his 20 years covering the drug war in the Americas, and drawing on interviews with politicians, cartel members and former FBI and DEA agents, he will show that the impact of the narco-presidents is felt far beyond the states they rule over - all the way up to the White House.

He has held positions at the Department of Experimental Psychology at Cambridge, and at the University of California, San Diego. He has ongoing artificial intelligence, virtual reality and robotics projects with Google and Random International. His TED talk on physical thinking has had more than 1 million views.

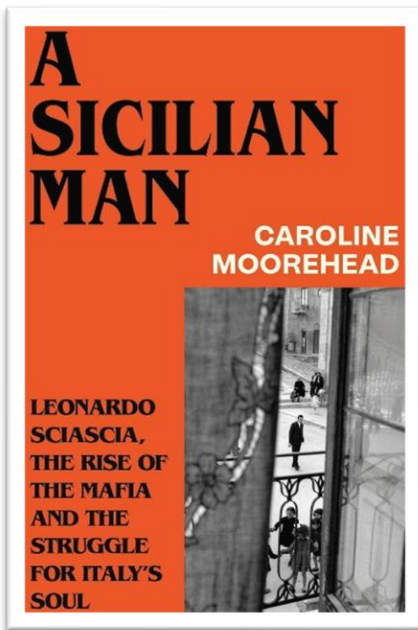

Witnessing the scale of corruption and violence, Sciascia predicted it would soon spread north, and he was right: by the 1980s, the Mafia had infiltrated every level of Italian politics and grown into an international, highly successful business.

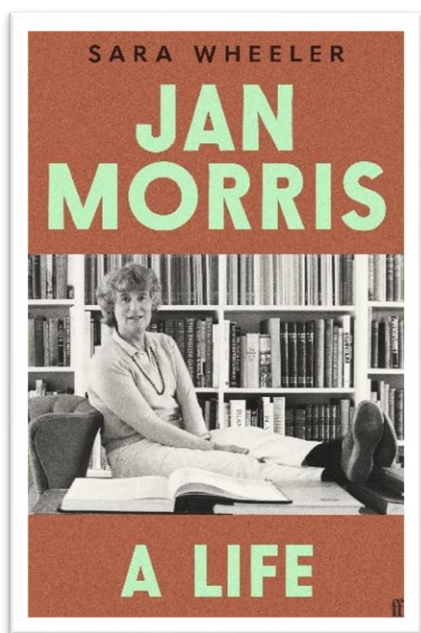
How to Think in a Time of Monsters by Louisa Toxvaerd Munch

The way we experience the world and how it is explained to us no longer add up. Institutions that we are told uphold certain values contradict themselves. The leaders we've elected on the promise of change, offer anything but. The statistics report growth while our conditions worsen. Culture is saturated in nostalgia while technology hurtles us into the future. We live in an age of misalignment, and no one seems to have a clue what to do about it. Politicians tell us to trust in the economy or the rule of law, that things are cyclical and what goes around comes around, but we've been trusting in those things for years and nothing's changed.

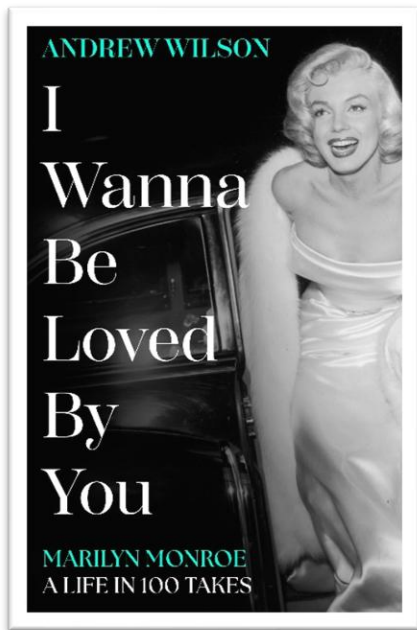
