



A Curious Scientist's Guide to Wellness, Ageing and Death by Prof. John S. Tregoning



An entertaining and good-humoured journey through the most common causes of death in the developed world.

Nature still wants you dead. Not just you, but your children and everyone you have ever met and everyone they have ever met. It wants you to cough and sneeze and poop yourself into an early grave. It wants your blood vessels to burst and pustules to explode all over your body. With the naivety of youth, we assume this is someone else's problem and we will in fact live forever.

Sadly, Nature does eventually win. And in spite of the vast steps forward in the prevention and

treatment of infectious disease, which have basically doubled the average life expectancy from 40 to 80 years in the last century, we do have to die of something. There comes a point where each of us must seriously contemplate our own mortality. For the author, it was on the 1st of December 2022, just after he pulled out his first grey chest hair. Entering his 'late 40s' he turned to pondering how he might die and if there was anything that could be done about it.

Research scientist, Prof. John S. Tregoning takes us on an entertaining and good-humoured journey through the most common causes of death in the developed world and, using himself as the guinea pig, investigates what we can do to delay the grim reaper's inevitable visit.



Prof. John S.Tregoning MA, PhD is reader in respiratory infections at Imperial College London. His research focuses on how virus and bacteria infect our lungs. He has published over 60 academic papers and remains at the forefront of infectious diseases research based at Imperial College London where he runs a research group. REJECTION A User's Guide by Liam Bell

Barely anyone working in the creative arts doesn't have war wounds when it comes to rejection. Yet is rejection only ever a negative?

In this thoughtful and engaging book, Liam explores the notion of rejection, asking questions of creative artists across a range of disciplines, from writing to acting, dance to music with the aim of offering pragmatic strategies for making use of rejection in a positive way, feeding creativity rather than stalling it, and enabling creatives to carry on with a sense of momentum. As such he seeks to transform our understanding of rejection from 'necessary evil' into a crucial and productive part of the artistic process.

Liam will be drawing on his own personal experience as a novelist and the experiences of his family (father an actor, sister a cellist) as well as interviewing creatives across the disciplines to arrive at a valuable template for dealing with the inevitable rejection that comes with a career in the arts. Rather than a roadmap to turn rejection into acceptance, or failure into success, avoiding the chastising tone of a self-help text or entrepreneurship manual and cliché advice of 'developing a thick skin' or 'every no gets you closer to a yes', it will seek to embrace rejection and to reconceive it as a vital and even celebrated part of every creative's journey so that when artists are asked, 'how do you deal with rejection?' they have a response which is positive and joyous.



Liam Bell has been gathering rejections for his writing since the age of eighteen. He is author of four novels (So It Is, 2012; The Busker, 2014; Man at Sea, 2022; The Sleepless, 2023). The eight year gap between the second and third books led to a crisis of confidence, in the face of a sustained period of rejection, and a subsequent fascination with the question of how and why creative artists keep persevering against all odds. He is a Senior Lecturer in Creative Writing at the University of Stirling and, in the course of that day job, has the

opportunity not only to work regularly with wonderful writers but also to rub shoulders with many of the practitioners and artists who have been interviewed for the purposes of this book. His background as a novelist, as someone who comes from a family of creatives, and his immersion in these practice-based academic fields across the creative arts makes him the ideal person to investigate how the modern creative responds to rejection and reflect on whether we can propose a better model which allows for rejection to become a productive part of the creative process.







STONE LANDS

A Journey of Darkness and Light Through Britain's Ancient Places by Fiona Robertson



How interacting with ancient sites can enrich our lives and offer inspiration in dark times.

Stone Lands combines folklore, history and archaeology with insights from a range of interesting stones enthusiasts, from Morris dancers, dowsers and pagans to artists, musicians and walkers to archivists and archaeologists. Describing her decades-long personal quest to explore the standing stones of Britain, it emphasises the wellbeing benefits that visiting ancient sites can bring, offering a way of connecting with nature, the past and ancient ways of being. Threaded through the book is the story of Fiona's experiences of

megalith hunting with her husband, Stephen, who she lost to cancer. While this story of loss and grief provides a narrative arc, this is a book that is very much about finding joy and embracing life whatever troubles we face. Fiona celebrates the empowering nature of megalith hunting, a hobby that, in her opinion, offers a profound way of interacting with our collective past and individual fates. Most of all she makes the point that tramping through fields in search of standing stones is just a huge amount of FUN.

There is a revival of megalith enthusiasm at the moment, which Fiona positions within the growth of movements such as Right to Roam, which promotes access to the countryside for all, and the work of artists such as Ben Edge, who sees visiting standing stones as a political act, enabling people of all backgrounds to find a common community in the pre-colonial deep past.



HOLD FAST

Mothering an autistic child to adulthood



An unforgettable story that shows what a gift it is to see someone not as the world tells them they should be, but as they are.

Catherine thought she was born to be a good mother. Surely any problems she encountered raising a child could be solved with love and effort - and boy, was she willing to put in the love and effort. So, aged thirty, she packed in her job to throw herself into full-time motherhood - only to crash headlong into the reality of a baby that did not seem to fit into the world. Catherine spent years being dismissed, told everything was her fault and being sent on yet another parenting course

(only to receive contradictory advice from the last one) until her daughter, Nina, was eventually diagnosed with autism, aged 10. The diagnosis helped Catherine understand Nina, but the challenges did not stop there.

Hold Fast is a frank and often funny account of raising an autistic child, alongside a non-autistic child, from birth right through the complexities and triumphs of the teenaged years. It is a candid heartfelt story of resilience and love between a parent and child, and of the stresses and joys of family life with an autistic child.

Catherine has learned a lot from motherhood but especially that it is sufficient to be a 'good enough' mother.

Memoir



Catherine Simpson was born and raised on a Lancashire dairy farm and moved to Edinburgh 30 years ago. In 2013, she won a Scottish Book Trust New Writers award for her novel *Truestory*. *Truestory* was inspired by Catherine's experiences raising her autistic daughter Nina. She and Nina now campaign for Autism Acceptance.

In 2016 Catherine received a Hawthornden Fellowship. Whilst there she began work on a memoir investigating the death by suicide of her

sister, Tricia. The resulting When I Had a Little Sister was published by Fourth Estate.

Another volume of memoir, *One Body*, was published by Saraband. This explores how a cancer diagnosis made Catherine reassess her experience of living in a woman's body and considers how our bodies tell the stories of our lives.

As a freelance journalist, her articles have appeared in, among others, *The Scotsman*, *The Herald* and *The Telegraph*.



THE TATTOOED HILLS

Journeys to Chalk Figures



A fascinating journey across Britain's landscape in search of its chalk figures and what they mean to us.

Across Britain, and especially in the southern chalklands, is a series of figures cut into the hills, exposing the chalk beneath. These hill-figures are strange, mysterious, and sometimes controversial. They are of varying and often contested age, and vague purpose. They are horses, giants, crosses, a lion, a lost panda, crowns, a kiwi, regimental badges. They are often sited near ancient trackways, iron age earthworks or dissolved monasteries, and or close to stone circles. Some are faded or lost, their names preserved only in the names of valleys

or hills.

Humans have long decorated their landscapes, but chalk hill figures are, almost uniquely, a feature of the English downland. This means they are sometimes seen as emblematic of Englishness, celebrated by poets, writers, artists and musicians. The book is a portrait of the places where these figures dominate, bringing in history, politics, literature, music, film and TV, but with a light touch. The Tattooed Hills isn't a nostalgic elegy for England, instead it uses the figures as a lens through which to explore the land and delves into more troubling undercurrents – the way that chalk hill figures have sometimes been appropriated, in an attempt to pin down a narrow definition of Englishness and belonging.

Chalk carvings are signals for our identity and identities, and that their long history, the way they have inspired artists, musicians and writers, and the communities that live in their shadows, offer an alternative way of thinking about ourselves. Often created as memorials for historical events, their meanings, like their shape, have shifted over the years, these new interpretations reflecting our changing society and values. They are beacons on the hills, they speak to us and of us, no matter where we live or where we're from



CTRL+ALT+CHAOS

How Teenage Hackers Rule the Internet by Joe Tidy



From the BBC's cyber correspondent and foremost voice on cybercrime comes the insider exposé of the global rise of teen hackers: Ctrl+Alt+Chaos.

Cyber correspondent Joe Tidy has investigated and interviewed the most infamous teenage hacker gangs of the past decade for the BBC, and previously for Sky News. Now he unveils the dark digital underbelly where teenage boys are reshaping cybersecurity, cryptocurrency, and organised crime under the noses of their parents.

Throughout he chronicles the life of Julius Kivimaki, aka Zeekill, arguably the most hated hacker in history, from 12-year-old nuisance hacker

to a Most Wanted cybercriminal culminating in his 2023 capture. In one of the cruellest hacks in history, he blackmailed 30,000 Finnish psychotherapy patients with their stolen notes. Kivimaki's story gives us vital insights into how hackers find their feet and become dangerous criminals.

Tracking the rise and fall of groups such as LulzSec, HTP, UG Nazi, and Lizard Squad, *Ctrl+Alt+Chaos* features exclusive interviews with the hackers as well as the police officers trying to stop them. Joe Tidy also draws parallels with recent high-profile attacks from other teenage gangs and ask the question - how can we stop the cycle of teenage boys hijacking life online?

True Crime



Joe Tidy is the BBC's first ever Cyber Correspondent and the foremost voice in the corporation on cybercrime and hacking. Over the past six years he has covered all major cyber-attacks for BBC TV, Radio, social media and website. He has made documentaries about cyber security travelling to the US, Russia, Saudi Arabia, Argentina, Germany and Ukraine to track down stories and characters. Joe's most high-profile news feature and documentary saw him travel to Russia in November 2021 in search of the world's most wanted cyber criminal. This hunt was read by 1m

people, viewed across social media more than 2.4m times and translated into 30 different languages across the BBC network. His top six BBC News documentaries have garnered more than 7 million views including 2.2m for The Teenage Millionaire Hacker and 1.4m for The Russian Hackers. THE INFECTIOUS MIND

How Social Contagion Makes Us III by Matilda Gosling

A fascinating look at the way medical and psychological conditions are socially transmitted, for fans of Jonathan Haidt and Suzanne O'Sullivan.

In 1518, Frau Troffea started dancing and found herself unable to stop. A short while later, an estimated fifteen people a day were dancing themselves to death.

At a time in which cats were thought to be familiar with the devil, a French nun began to meow. Her behaviour spread until her sisters were meowing for hours each day in what were later described as the convent's 'cat-concerts'. A 1997 television episode of Pokémon reportedly caused up to 12,000 Japanese children to fall ill, many of whom were later discovered to have developed symptoms only once they'd seen their friends succumbing.

These social outbreaks have gained new purchase with the internet. In 2019, Jan Zimmerman started a Youtube channel. His videos showed him with tics and tic-like behaviours that included strange movements, swear words and insults. Within three months, he had a million subscribers. These tic-like behaviours started to spread, and those afflicted passed them on to a fresh wave of contacts.

The Infectious Mind describes the social contagion of physical and mental illness, together with the factors that drive transmission. It explores how humans change the way they express their distress through time and culture, and what this means for some very modern epidemics, including TikTok tics, orthorexia, long Covid, chronic pain and broader mental ill-health. How do social and psychological forces combine with biology to create such strange, visceral symptoms? What turns a social outbreak into something that insinuates its way into the neural pathways of large swathes of humanity? Why are we all vulnerable to the social contagion of illness? The Infectious Mind uses stories from outbreaks past and present to answer these questions. It offers readers a reassuring road-map to their solution and prevention in an era of internet-enabled rapid transmission.



THE END OF THE GAY RIGHTS REVOLUTION

How Hubris and Overreach Threaten Gay Freedom by Ronan McCrea



Why we risk a great regression on gay rights in the west – and how to stop it.

The gay rights movement in the West has succeeded beyond its wildest dreams – but this success seems suddenly fragile.

Ronan McCrea's important book argues that this is no blip. Forces favourable to gay rights – such as the wider cultural shift towards greater sexual freedom – are weakening, while political developments, cultural changes and migration patterns mean that sources of opposition, both old and new, are gaining strength. The gay rights movement is ill-equipped to meet this challenge. Convinced that history is on its side, the movement







A Tale of Witch Hunting and War in Seventeenth Century Britain



A completely new history of Britain's biggest witch hunt (of 1640-50) and why it is relevant today.

Witchland tells the sensational story of a series of witch trials that convulsed Britain between 1640 and 1650. It was a witch hunt that began separately in south-east England and Lowland Scotland in the early 1640s and grew into a mass panic that killed hundreds of convicted 'witches' over the next decade. Most of these people lived in England's eastern counties, where around 200-300 probably died – records are incomplete – but there were also important trials across Britain from West Lothian to Cornwall to Northamptonshire to Northumbia

during this time. These trials were all related – by the puritan theology that drove them and by the violence and economic disruption that encouraged people to turn on each other. Some of the witch hunts' stories have been told individually before, but this book brings together ten cases demonstrating the huge national scale of the crisis. The ten cases each explore a community in turmoil, with a strong focus on the characters of the accused and accusers.

The British civil wars of the seventeenth century can seem intimidating in their complexity, but this book keeps the focus tightly on personal stories. The war rages in the background, but the reader will be fascinated by what happened to Anne West, Ellen Driver, Henry Maggs, Ann Jefferies and the other accused people whose stories structure each chapter in turn. One accused witch shares the author's name – Marion Gibson – with provides a unique opportunity for the author to explore the personal impact of a witch trial and the sense that 'it could have been me'.

The 1640-50 witch hunt shows us an unreasonable, angry and polarised Britain with echoes in the present. It deals with topics such as inequality, the refugee crisis of the civil war, and the violence that can develop from name-calling and stereotyping.
