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

Darrin Bell **THE TALK**

Darrin Bell was six years old when his mother told him he couldn't have a realistic water gun. She said she feared for his safety, that police tend to think of little Black boys as older and less innocent than they really are.

Through evocative illustrations and sharp humor, Bell examines how The Talk shaped intimate and public moments from childhood to adulthood. While coming of age in Los Angeles—and finding a voice through cartooning—Bell becomes painfully aware of being regarded as dangerous by white teachers, neighbors, and police officers and thus of his mortality. Drawing attention to the brutal murders of African Americans and showcasing revealing insights and cartoons along the way, he brings us up to the moment of reckoning when people took to the streets protesting the murders of George Floyd and Breonna Taylor. And now Bell must decide whether he and his own six-year-old son are ready to have The Talk.

Darrin Bell, recipient of the 2016 Berryman Award for Editorial Cartooning, the 2015 RFK Jr. award for editorial cartooning, and UC Berkeley's 2015 Daily Californian Alumni of the Year

Award, began his career in 1995 at the age of 20. While serving as the Daily Cal's staff cartoonist, he began freelancing to the Opinion pages of *The Los Angeles Times, The San Francisco Chronicle*, and *The Oakland Tribune*. In 1997, he co-created the comic strip "Rudy Park" and self-syndicated it to technology magazines. United Media launched it into newspapers in 2001. In 2003, Darrin launched his other comic strip "Candorville" into newspapers via the Washington Post Writers Group, which also began syndicating his editorial cartoons in 2013. While WPWG still syndicates Candorville and Rudy Park, Darrin moved his editorial cartoons to King Features Syndicate in late 2018. He's also a contributing cartoonist for *The New Yorker*. Darrin lives with his wife and two children in California.

A book that not only makes you feel less alone, but makes you laugh in a world that seems intent on bringing you down. Whoever said you can't be both outraged AND outrageous?





In this groundbreaking exploration of the postpartum brain, Chelsea Conaboy, a veteran journalist, explodes the concept of "maternal instinct," and tells a new story about what it means to become a parent.

In recent years, scientists have discovered that the surge of hormones experienced by all new parents—birthing or otherwise—sets off both structural and functional changes in a parent's brain designed to meet their baby's basic needs in those tenuous first days, and to learn how to parent. These changes are so dramatic that researchers can easily sort those who have had a pregnancy from those who haven't, and the emerging science is providing key insights into the wide-ranging experience of parenthood—from the intensity of emotions to the unexpected upsides to its larger role in species survival.

The reality is far more meaningful than the romanticized idea that mothers spring into being by instinct, yet neuroscience has remained almost entirely absent from

the public conversation about what it means to be a mother. Chelsea Conaboy weaves together her own and others' personal stories, cutting edge neuroscience and social psychology, and the writings of feminist scholars to produce a powerful new narrative of parenthood.

Chelsea Conaboy is a veteran journalist, specializing in personal and public health. She was part of the *Boston Globe*'s Pulitzer prize-winning team for coverage of the Boston Marathon bombing and more recently, has worked as a freelance magazine writer with bylines at *Mother Jones, Politico, The Week, The Boston Globe Magazine*, and others. She lives in Maine with her husband, their two young sons, and her own changing maternal brain.



Cin Fabré WOLF HUSTLE A Black Woman On Wall Street

From the South Bronx projects to the boardroom—at only nineteen years old, Cin Fabré ran with the wolves of Wall Street.

Growing up, Cin Fabré didn't know anything about the stock market. But she learned how to hustle from her immigrant parents, saving money so that one day she could escape her abusive father and poverty in the Bronx.

Through a tip from a friend, Cin pushed her way into brokerage firm VTR Capital—an offshoot of Stratton Oakmont, the company where the Wolf of Wall Street, Jordan Belfort, had reigned. She was shocked to find an army of young workers, mostly Black and Brown, with no real prospects for promotion sitting at phones doing the drudge work of finding investment leads for white male brokers. But she felt the pull of profit and knew she would do whatever she had to do to be successful.

Pulling back the curtain on the inequities she and so many others faced, WOLF

HUSTLE reveals how Cin worked grueling hours, ascending from cold caller to stockbroker, becoming the only Black woman to do so at her firm. She also discloses the excesses she took part in on 1990s Wall Street—the strip clubs, the Hamptons parties, the Gucci shopping sprees—while reveling in the thrill of making money.

From landing clients worth hundreds of millions to gaining, losing, then gaining back fortunes in seconds, Cin examines her years spent trading frantically and hustling successfully, grappling with what it takes to build a rich life, and, ultimately, beating Wall Street at its own game.

Cin Fabré is a New Yorker born and raised in the South Bronx and Queens. At the age of nineteen, she joined a brokerage house on Wall Street, eventually becoming a high-earning broker at a top firm, before leaving in search of a more meaningful life. Today, she divides her time between New York City and Europe and enjoys spending time with her wife and four children. **WOLF HUSTLE** is her first book.



A Young Woman, a Devious Surgeon, and the Harrowing Birth of Modern Women's Health

For more than a century, Dr. J. Marion Sims was hailed as the "father of modern gynecology." He founded a hospital in New York City and had a profitable career treating gentry and royalty in Europe, becoming one of the world's first celebrity surgeons. Statues were built in his honor, but he wasn't the hero he had made himself appear to be.

Sims's greatest medical claim was the result of several years of experimental surgeries—without anesthesia—on a young enslaved woman known as Anarcha; his so-called cure for obstetric fistula forever altered the path of women's health. One medical text after another hailed Anarcha as the embodiment of the pivotal role that Sims played in the history of surgery. Decades later, a groundswell of women objecting to Sims's legacy celebrated

Anarcha as the "mother of gynecology." Little was known about the woman herself. The written record would have us believe Anarcha disappeared; she did not.

Through tenacious research, J. C. Hallman has unearthed the first evidence of Anarcha's life that did not come from Sims's suspect reports. Hallman reveals that after helping to spark a patient-centered model of care that continues to improve women's lives today, Anarcha lived on as a midwife, nurse, and "doctor woman." **SAY ANARCHA** excavates history, deconstructing the biographical smoke screen of a surgeon who has falsely been enshrined as a medical pioneer and bringing forth a heroic Black woman to her rightful place at the center of the creation story of modern women's health care.

J.C. Hallman is the author of five previous works of nonfiction and a book of short stories. His previous work on Anarcha has appeared in *Harper's Magazine*, the *Forum* (of the African American Policy Forum), the *Baffler*, *Montgomery Advertiser*, and *Urology*. He has been the recipient of fellowships from the McKnight Foundation and the John Simon Guggenheim Memorial Foundation, in the general nonfiction category.

Anne Hull grew up in the fragrant isolation of rural central Florida, barefoot half the time and running through the groves her father's family had worked for generations. The ground trembled from the vibrations of bulldozers and jackhammers clearing land for Walt Disney World. "Look now," her father told her as they rode through the mossy landscape together. "It will all be gone." But the real threat was at home, where Hull was pulled between her idealistic but self-destructive father and her mother, a glamorous misfit from Brooklyn struggling with her own aspirations. In their bedroom closet, they kept a typewriter, a liquor bottle and a gun. All the while, Hull felt the pressures of girlhood closing in. A misfit herself, she dreamed of becoming a traveling salesman who ate in motel coffee shops, accompanied by her baton-twirling babysitter in white boots. As her sexual identity took shape, Hull knew the place she loved would never love her back, and began plotting her escape.

Here, Hull captures it all—the smells and sounds of a disappearing way of life, the secret rituals and rhythms of a doomed family, the casual racism of the rural south in the 1960s, and the suffocating expectations placed on girls and women. Vividly atmospheric and haunting, **THROUGH THE GROVES** will speak to anyone who's ever left home to cut a path of their own.

Anne Hull is a journalist and Pulitzer Prize-winning reporter who spent nearly two decades at the *Washington Post.* She's a recipient of the Robert F. Kennedy Journalism Award, the Investigative Reporters and Editors Medal and has been a Pulitzer Prize finalist several times. She has written for *The New Yorker* and taught journalism as a visiting professor at Princeton University. Born in Plant City, Florida, Hull attended Florida State University and worked as a reporter for the Tampa Bay Times. She lives in Washington, D.C.

For readers of Kiese Laymon's *Heavy*, and works like *Punch Me Up to The Gods* and *A Little Devil in America*, a beautiful, painful, and soaring tribute to everything that Black men are and can be.

Growing up in the Bronx in the '80s and '90s, Joél Leon wasn't taught how to feel. Shaped by a singular view of Black masculinity espoused by the media, by family and friends, and by society, he learned instead to care about the gold around his neck and the number of bills in his wallet. He absorbed the "facts" that white was always right and Black men were great for comic relief, but never worthy of the opening credits. It wasn't until years later that Joél understood he didn't have to be defined by these things.

Now, in this collection of wide-ranging essays, he takes readers from his upbringing in the Bronx to his life raising two little girls of his own, unraveling those narratives to arrive at a deeper understanding of who he is as a son, friend, partner, and father. Traversing both the serious and lighthearted, from his childhood fascination with Suzanne Somers to his decision to seek therapy to the difficulties of making friends as an adult Black man, Joél cracks open his heart to reveal the multitudes that he encompasses.



Expanding beyond her own family, Tracie alternates her story with single-chapter profiles tracking the "white bonus" of five other subjects of various classes and places, which showcase an ecosystem of institutions and practices that are supposed to treat all people the same but usually only benefit whites.

To date, there has not been a book that addresses the white working-class experience while engaging directly with race, nor one that takes the amorphous problem of racial privilege and quantifies it. **THE WHITE BONUS** combines these approaches, and prompts an urgent question: What can we do about it?

Tracie McMillan's first book, *The American Way of Eating* (Scribner, 2012), was widely celebrated for the depth of its reporting and investigative work. In addition, McMillan is an established journalist, publishing in *The New York Times, The Washington Post, The Los Angeles Times, National Geographic, Mother Jones* and *Food & Wine.*

Spanning across decades of Americana, **SELLING SEXY** tells the story of how Victoria's Secret under the leadership of controversial business mogul Les Wexner disrupted the intimates' market to define female beauty and sex standards for generations before its gradual collapse as the brand failed to keep with the ever more rapidly evolving fashion and cultural landscape.

Victoria's Secret is one of the most influential, and polarizing, brands to ever infiltrate the psyche of the American consumer. The company's catalog made national headlines in the '70s for its glamorization of lingerie, which was, in the post-bra burning era, sold either by puritanical department stores or tawdry, red-light district shops. By 1984, the owners were forced to sell to Columbus retail magnate Les Wexner, who was swiftly building an empire that would shape retail as we knew it for the next 40 years.

Just a decade later, Victoria's Secret was a billion-dollar brand, selling the majority of bras bought in the US. However, its ubiquity in underwear drawers couldn't compare to the influence it had on the greater culture, helping to define what it meant to look like a happy, successful—and most importantly, sexy—modern woman to a whole generation of consumers across the globe through its airbrushed advertisements, pink velvet-lined stores, and annual televised fashion show, which drew in millions of viewers each year.

But as culture changed, Victoria's Secret did not change with it. Not only did the company miss out on big expansion opportunities it also refused to change its marketing as the world became less obsessed with thinness and perfection, and more keenly focused on body acceptance. Meanwhile, Wexner, the mastermind, became increasingly known for his complicated relationship with sex trafficker Jeffrey Epstein, whose lifestyle he funded for many years. In March 2021, with his legacy in peril, Wexner and his wife Abigail stepped down from the Victoria's Secret board as he faced investigation by the FBI.

Today, Victoria's Secret is trying to rebuild its reputation—and maintain the still-significant grip it has on the consumer. **SELLING SEXY** expertly draws from sources within the company and across the fashion industry to examine: What happens now to a brand with such a heavy history?

Lauren Sherman has spent the last 15 years reporting on the inner workings of the fashion industry. She is currently the chief correspondent for *The Business of Fashion* and began her career as a staff reporter at *Forbes*. THE SEWING GIRL'S TALE is a riveting historical drama that tells the story of the first published rape trial in American history, as well as the fault lines of class privilege and gender bias that it exposed—showing how much has changed over two centuries and how much has not.

In September 1793, a crime was committed in the back room of a New York brothel on a moonless night—the kind of crime that even victims usually kept secret. Instead, seventeen-year-old seamstress Lanah Sawyer did what virtually no one else had done: she charged a gentleman with rape.

When Lanah raised her voice, she was dismissed as a mere "sewing-girl," led astray by romantic delusions. But she refused to stay silent. Her accusation sparked a sensational courtroom drama and a relentless struggle for vindication that divided both Lanah's and her assailant's families and threatened both of their lives. The ongoing conflict attracted the nation's top lawyers, including Alexander Hamilton, and shaped the development of American law. The crime and its

consequences became a kind of parable about the power of seduction and the limits of justice. Eventually, Lanah Sawyer did succeed in holding her assailant accountable—but at a terrible cost to herself.

Based on rigorous historical detective work, this book takes us from a chance encounter in the street into the sanctuaries of the city's elite, the shadows of its brothels, and the despair of its debtors' prison. **THE SEWING GIRL'S TALE** shows that if our laws and our culture were changed by a persistent young woman and the power of words two hundred years ago, they can be changed again.

John Wood Sweet is a professor of history at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and former director of the Program in Sexuality Studies. He has received fellowships from the National Endowment for the Humanities, the Mellon Foundation, the National Humanities Center, the Institute for Arts and Humanities at UNC, and the Gilder Lehrman Center at Yale, among others. His first book, *Bodies Politic: Colonial, Race, and the Emergence of the American North*, was a finalist for the Frederick Douglass Prize. He was named a Top Young Historian by the History News Network and has served as a Distinguished Lecturer for the Organization of American Historians. He lives in Chapel Hill with his husband, son, and daughter.



In 1791, Thomas Jefferson hired a Black man to help survey Washington, DC. That man was Benjamin Banneker, an African American mathematician, a writer of almanacs, and the greatest astronomer of his generation. Banneker then wrote what would become a famous letter to Jefferson, imploring the new president to examine his hypocrisy, as someone who claimed to love liberty yet was an enslaver. More than two centuries later, Rachel Jamison Webster, an ostensibly white woman, learns that this groundbreaking Black forefather is also her distant relative.

Acting as a storyteller, Webster draws on oral history and conversations with her "DNA cousins" to imagine the lives of their shared ancestors across eleven

generations, among them Banneker's grandparents, an interracial couple who broke the law to marry when America was still a conglomerate of colonies under British rule. These stories shed light on the legal construction of whiteness and display the genius and resistance of early African Americans in the face of increasingly unjust laws, some of which are still in effect in the present day.

Rachel Jamison Webster is a professor of creative writing at Northwestern University and the author of four books of poetry and cross-genre writing. She has taught writing workshops through the Urban League, Chicago Public Schools, Gallery 37, and the Pacific Northwest College of Art, working to bring diversity and antiracist awareness into the creative writing curriculum. THE POVERTY TRAP is an investigative work that provides a critical look at microfinance, an idea championed by Muhammad Yunus in the 1970s, when Bangladesh was hit by severe floods and famine. Yunus created Grameen Bank, known as the "bank of the poor," in order to give small loans to the local population, mostly to women (the men would just drink the loan away). The idea was that they would use these small loans to start local businesses that would in turn lift them out of poverty.

It became a hugely popular program, one eventually heralded by Obama, Oprah, and Bono. But there was a problem. When journalist Mara Kardas-Nelson decided to research criminalized petty debt in Sierra Leone, she stumbled across women being threatened by the police, and sometimes put in jail, when they couldn't pay off their microfinance debts. This launched her into an investigation of the industry. She learned that big banks had morphed a pro-poor program into a for-profit business over just a few decades. Millions of women across the developing world are now trapped in layers of debt thanks to high interest, quick turnaround loans; some commit suicide, others put their children to work.

Kardas-Nelson interviewed key players, including Muhammad Yunus himself; she also met insiders with growing doubts. How did the world's most famous anti-poverty program come to look more like a predatory payday lending scheme? Why does microfinance continue despite mounds of evidence that it doesn't work? Through a combination of big-picture analysis and close reporting, **THE POVERTY TRAP** will provide a vivid depiction of microfinancing's victims and uncover the truth of the practice.

If you've ever heard the phrase <u>"The revolution will not be televised</u>" then you've heard the words of Gil Scott-Heron, the legendary jazz musician, poet, activist and author. His father, Abed, gets word of the crash and rushes to the site. The scene is chaos—the children have been taken to different hospitals in Jerusalem and the West Bank; some are missing, others cannot be identified. Abed sets off on an odyssey to learn Milad's fate. It is every parent's worst nightmare, but for Abed it is compounded by the maze of physical, emotional, and bureaucratic obstacles he must navigate because he is Palestinian. He is on the wrong side of the separation wall, holds the wrong ID to pass the military checkpoints, and has the wrong papers to enter the city of Jerusalem.

Abed's quest to find Milad is interwoven with the stories of a cast of Jewish and Palestinian characters whose lives and histories unexpectedly converge: a kindergarten teacher and a mechanic who rescue children from the burning bus; an Israeli army commander and a Palestinian official who confront the aftermath at the scene of the crash; a settler paramedic; ultra-Orthodox emergency service workers; and two mothers who each hope to claim one severely injured boy.

Immersive and gripping, **A DAY IN THE LIFE OF ABED SALAMA** is an indelibly human portrait of the Jewish-Palestinian struggle that offers a new understanding of the tragic history and reality of one of the most contested places on earth.



Using the insights of psychoanalysis as probing agents, Fromm's work analyzes the illness of contemporary civilization as witnessed by its willingness to submit to totalitarian rule.

Erich Fromm was a German-born U.S. psychoanalyst and social philosopher who explored the interaction between psychology and society. He died in 1980.





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
