




The Mother of All Calamities

A heartfelt, thought-provoking, and funny story that satirises contemporary parenting culture.

In the leafy suburb of Greengully, Chrissy, an enthusiastic primary school teacher, faces the indignity of an inept male colleague promoted above her. On top of that, the expectations, hypocrisy, and prejudice of her students' parents begin to spill into the classroom, dampening her desire to have children and jeopardising her relationship with her fiancé.

Across town, Jenny's son is becoming violent towards her; Estelle is trying to advocate for her child, the school bully; Viv is hiding a dark secret from her past, risking everything she's built.

In overlapping stories, *The Mother of All Calamities* brilliantly captures the complexities of parenthood through the lives of four women as they struggle with womanhood, motherhood, and their perpetual relegation to the background, supporting others and running their families. All of them hold secrets...but some are darker than others.



She soon becomes entangled in a deadly feud between the ruling Gods and followers of the Old Ways—believers who are trying to bring back an extinct race of Ever-Blessed beings powerful enough to overthrow the Gods. Elva must conceal her own connection to the Ever while navigating the growing bond with Fynton, her insolent betrothed who unknowingly harbours one of the most powerful Ever souls — and may be the key to saving the fading Ever.

Meanwhile, Innes, a midwife and Ever-Blessed Witch, embarks on a desperate quest to cure the blight caused by the fading magic. With her family's life on the line, her journey leads to Vettona where she unexpectedly meets her twin soul, a Vettonian Warrior – and Elva's exgirlfriend. Torn between love and her mission, Innes must defy the wrath of the Gods in order to save those she loves, before it's too late.

In the spirit of A Court of Thorns and Roses by Sarah J. Maas, The Serpent and the Wings of Night by Carissa Broadbent, and The Plated Prisoner Series by Raven Kennedy, this romantic fantasy blends mythology and magic in an epic battle for survival.

Bird has already died twenty-two times, each time just before her 15th birthday. Who can she trust to break the pattern?

Himalayas: unknown year.

'Ten thousand strands of trouble,' is what Bird's father says, watching as Bird's sister braids her hair. On the eve of her fourteenth year, that trouble finds Bird. She recruits her only friend Teshi and flees her home to escape an arranged marriage. They vanish into a crowd of pilgrims on the way to the Holy Mountain-not knowing that violence is circling and now has its eyes on Bird.


Darwin: present day.

Waking in a hospital bed, Bird tries to remember what brought her here. A man whose gaze she knew to fear, a stolen car, a plastic gun, and a real bullet in her shoulder. Strand by strand, memories return of her first life and the Holy Mountain, and she faces the awful truth that she is stuck in a never-ending pattern. Every life, she dies alone before she reaches the age of 15. When nurse Margie wants to help Bird, why is her instinct always to run? The lesson she has failed to learn so far is that to survive, she must learn to trust and can't liberate herself alone.

A masterful and profoundly moving novel about a girl determined to live on her own terms, no matter the cost. Bird is an unforgettable story of hope, resilience and the power of connection.



COURTNEY COLLINS is a writer and producer and a creative writing teacher. In 2017 she started Ngukurr Story Projects to support First Nations storytellers to tell stories in their traditional languages. Her first novel, The Burial (Allen & Unwin), was published in ten countries and shortlisted for the Stella Prize, the Nita B Kibble Literary Award and NSW Premier's Literary Awards for New Writing. It is being adapted as a feature film. Courtney holds a Masters of Creative Writing from the University of Melbourne. Two women grow up worlds apart. Beyond being motherless, they have nothing in common – and yet become connected in ways they could never have imagined.

For Ava, heading to university in Sydney is her escape from a povertystricken upbringing. Her mother is long gone, her father able to provide love but little else. On the other side of the world, Laurie tolerates university only at the insistence of her father, a Marxist professor. Her mother died in childbirth, and Laurie dreams of freedom, far from the Cambridge cloisters.

It is within these college grounds that Ava and Laurie cross paths. They could not be more different, and yet as each grapples with the lasting effects of losing a mother, their lives become entwined in ways neither could have anticipated.

Two Daughters explores family, class, social justice and love with a large dose of wit, the occasional detour into darkness, but always with the heartbeat of hope.



ALISON EDWARDS was born in Australia but has lived and worked in UK/Europe for the last two decades. After studying journalism and German, she obtained her PhD in linguistics at the University of Cambridge, focusing on language ideologies and policy, particularly the ownership of English by non-native speakers. Her debut *Two Daughters* draws on that experience, especially the pressures on young academics to succeed at all costs. Alison lives in Amsterdam with her family where she works as a translator and editor. She started writing a second novel about a female Bansky-style artist set between NY and Amsterdam. Love Overdue


Nobody knows better than Lauren Green that dating a student's dad is totally off limits. Too bad love isn't always by the book!

When Vice Principal Lauren Green calls a meeting with April's parents, she is shocked when her high school sweetheart, Jamie, strolls into her office. Jamie is your typical M.I.A. dad, too busy to take an active role in rearing his own child. He's swapped his baggy jeans for a pinstriped suit and is now a hotshot publishing director, but his intoxicating smile and shrewd charm are still very much the same. What enrages Lauren the most though, is that Jamie doesn't seem to remember her. Not even in the slightest.

In a bid to save his daughter from being suspended, Jamie begrudgingly joins the Parent Teachers Association. When a blockage in the boy's toilets floods the school's library, Lauren and Jamie are forced to come up with a plan to save as many books as possible. And fast. 






Previous books sold in 10 territories




On a quiet night in 1972, two girls each make a choice...

In alternating chapters poetically called Limb One and Limb Two, the novel follows two unnamed women over three decades, starting in the 1980s during the AIDS epidemic. Their lives nearly intersect in pivotal moments where the physical distance between them draws so thin that their bodies almost collide.

From their high school in a steel city to Sydney University and then a small Welsh town; from classrooms and art galleries; to beds and bars, hospitals and homes, we watch these two lives ebb and flow, with joy and grief and loss and desire, shadowing each other through the decades until, at last, they coalesce in the most beautiful and surprising of fashions.

A LANGUAGE OF LIMBS offers an intimate portrait of queer bodies, art, heartbreak, joy and the unseen connections that bind us.







DYLIN HARDCASTLE is an author, artist, and screenwriter and former Provost's Scholar at the University of Oxford. They are the author of three critically acclaimed books: *Below Deck* (Allen & Unwin 2020) sold in 10 territories, *Breathing Under Water* (Hachette 2016), and *Running Like China* (Hachette 2015). Dylin is the co-creator, co-writer and co-director of the TV series *Cloudy River*, which premiered at Mardi Gras Film Festival 2020 and acquired by SBS On Demand. Dylin has travelled to Antarctica, South America and Europe for artist residencies, and was a research assistant in World Literature at the University of Oxford. They are currently completing their PhD in Creative Writing.

When men are at war, what is expected of the women left behind.

When her boyfriend Max decides to enlist in the army, Marta is torn. It is 2015 and the fighting is in the Donbas region, thousands of kilometers away from the comfortable nest the young couple have built themselves in Lviv. Both have successful careers and have a cosy life, distant from politics and war. Until Max's decision to go and fight at the front.

With Max away, Marta tries hard to fit the model of a war hero's girlfriend and to embrace the new patriotic spirit. She volunteers for the Army, meeting other women whose partners are away fighting, but she struggles with letting the war into her life the way others do, and her resentment towards Max builds.

At breaking point, one drunken night, Marta has a passionate liaison with a female friend. Then she jumps at an opportunity to travel to France where she meets Xavier. On the way to a party, they are separated in the chaos following a terrorist attack. Left with nothing but her purse, she has no idea what happened to Xavier or how to find him.

Back home in Ukraine, depression sets in and she stops returning Max's phone calls. Marta realizes that the burden to conform is impeding her from living her true spirit. The idea of leaving Ukraine, mixed with guilt and bitterness takes hold of her.

HASKA SHYYAN is a writer, poet, and translator. Born in Lviv where she co-owns a bookshop, Haska studied Classical Philology and wrote her first novel *Hunt, Doctor, Hunt!* on her cell phone while bedridden with a rare complication of meningitis called Hunt syndrome. *Behind Their Backs* was the first Ukrainian novel to receive the European Union Prize for Literature in 2019, as well as two Ukrainian literary awards (LltAccent Award and Espreso TV Readers Choice). She regularly contributes short stories and poetry to literary magazines. After the war began she moved to Brussels and has just returned to Lviv with her husband and daughter. 
At the gaming house Solitaires, Georgina encounters the mysterious Lady Elizabeth Mortimer, whose immunity to her charm piques Georgina's interest, compelling her to go to increasingly outrageous lengths to seduce her.

Georgina's adventure includes running half-naked through London, attending balls and masquerades, lazing in dens of iniquity, interrupting duels and finding herself in a prison cell. Her days are rarely quiet.

In her quest to restore Arthur's fortune, Georgina navigates a complex world of villains and secrets, all the while discovering her own heart. After almost losing her chance with Elizabeth through mistrust, reckless behaviour, and an unresolved issue from the past, Georgina finally surrenders to her happy-ever-after. As a mother to a daughter with Down Syndrome and partner to a transgender woman, Jessica draws from a well of personal experience that enriches her storytelling. Her own journey with Autistic Spectrum Disorder, coupled with her love for historical romance, fuels her literary pursuits, and she crafts tales where visibility, equality, and love flourish. Her writing weaves together themes of sexual orientation, gender, race and disability, ensuring broad appeal that transcends boundaries and invites all to see themselves on the page. 

And it's not just any invitation - several spirit mediums like her have also been invited to compete against one another, to see who can contact the actress' murdered husband and identify his killer. The reward is a significant sum of money, and Mei jumps at the opportunity.

Once the competition is underway, however, Mei discovers a link between the murdered husband and long-buried events of her past in Shanghai. Slowly she realizes that this competition must be stopped. Nobody can be allowed to win...Decades later, Mei's American daughter tries to uncover the truth behind the urban legend that this séance has become.

Rosie's only inheritance from her reclusive mother is a book of fairy tales. But there is another story lurking between the lines and in all the white spaces...

1991. Rosie regularly hears the voice of her older sister who was killed eleven years ago in their Moscow apartment. Now an Oxford University student, Rosie lives in exile with her reclusive, alcoholic mother who refuses to talk about the past. When she dies, Rosie sees a chance to find out what really happened in Moscow. She answers a job ad to become the assistant to charismatic and celebrated Soviet dissident Alexey Ivanov, and accompanies him to Russia to research the fate of a mysterious woman known as Kukolka who disappeared decades ago.

This research and the book of handwritten fairy tales left behind by her mother plunge Rosie into Russia on the eve of the 1917 Revolution, a world of sweeping romance, violence, and betrayal. The deeper she goes, the more everything she believed to be true about her family begins to unravel. Before she reaches the final tale, Rosie must decide how much she truly wants to know.

The Last Russian Doll is a family saga that spans three generations and the lifetime of Soviet Russia. It explores how our innate yearning for family and identity can lead to devastating truths – but also forgiveness and redemption.

An Act of Truth and Fiction

Your oldest and dearest friends know you best and forgive you the most...or do they?

Best-selling author Marnie Elliott is about to be exposed. Her last two books haven't been great, and she is well behind the deadline on the next. Now a journalist has uncovered the 'lies, untruths and exaggerations' she has used to garner sympathy. Keen to escape the vitriol and outrage, she organises a holiday in a remote corner of Tasmania with her three oldest friends. 



Because I'm Not Myself, You See A Memoir Of Motherhood, Madness And Coming Back From The Brink

A raw, hopeful and darkly funny memoir of postpartum psychosis and recovery.

Ariane Beeston is a psychologist working for child protection when she gives birth to her first child – and experiences postnatal psychosis. As she navigates new motherhood, she suffers from scary delusions and hallucinations, which she keeps secret out of fear and shame.

Ariane is convinced something is physically wrong with her son, something she can't articulate. At times, the baby in the pram looks like a tiny red dragon. She panics when he develops nappy rash, certain that social services will know and remove him – just as she once removed other mother's babies as part of her job in frontline child protection.


Months pass and Ariane breaks further from reality, with thoughts of harming herself and her son. While trying to get help for sleeping issues, breastfeeding and psychiatric support, she faces conflicting advice and one setback after another in a stretched and fragmented system.

Finally admitted to a mother and baby psychiatric unit, Ariane is forced to learn how to be a patient. The shame of being in a psych ward as a psychologist and social worker is overwhelwing – and humbling.

Woven with research and expert commentary, Ariane joins a growing chorus of voices breaking down the taboo of maternal mental illness. *Because I'm not Myself You See* (paraphrased from Lewis Caroll) is also about life on the other side: trying to make sense of what doesn't make sense, and finding humour, beauty, joy and purpose.



ARIANE BEESTON is a writer, mental health advocate and former child protection caseworker and psychologist. She works for The Centre of Perinatal Excellence as Communications and Content Manager. She is passionate about using her lived experience of severe perinatal mental health issues to ensure hopeful, expectant, and new parents receive the treatment, care, and support they need. 
