


An audacious retelling of history across the Indian Ocean through the voices of child slaves Shammy and George.

It's 1810 in the British colony of New South Wales, Australia. George Jarvis, slave to Governor Lachlan Macquarie, wants his master's permission to return to India to find his mother. Yet he is compelled to serve this Scotsman who has been like a father to him since he was purchased - at five years old - from a slave market in India.

George's plans to return to India are further thwarted when he falls for Shammy, an ambitious, vivacious, opinionated woman with plans of her own. Then a gun goes off and sets in motion a chain of events with heartbreaking consequences.

Set in India, Australia and Scotland and tracing Indian Ocean slavery, the flamboyant Shammy narrates their life story of servitude and survival. The novel explores power, privilege, scandalous actions, fabulous clothes and a gin distillery.

In the vein of *Remember, Remember* by Elle Machray and *The God of Small Things* by Arundhati Roy, *The Servants* audaciously re-imagines history from the perspective of the vanquished.



ROANNA GONSALVES is a writer, scriptwriter and script consultant. She has a PhD and currently works as a Senior Lecturer in Creative Writing at UNSW, (Sydney) while also teaching and mentoring in communities and schools. Born and brought up in Mumbai, India, she moved to Australia in 1998 as an international student. Her short story collection, *The Permanent Resident* (UWAP 2018), won the NSW Premier's Literary Award Multicultural Prize, was longlisted for the Dobbie Literary Award and was published in India & South Asia. Roanna is the recipient of the Bridge Awards inaugural Varuna-Cove Park (Scotland) Writing residency. She is the incoming editor of <u>Southerly</u>, Australia's oldest literary journal. No One's Looking

The secret rage and brawling love between two middle-aged sisters, prompted by the gift of a purple dildo.

Susan finds the dildo in the late afternoon. It's in the back of her cupboard, a misguided gift from her younger sister Vicki. Susan's husband has just asked to open up the marriage — she has agreed to it and doesn't know why. The more time Susan spends with the dildo — making dinner with it propped up on the counter, having a glass of wine with it next to her on the couch, wandering around the supermarket with it in her handbag — the more she sees it as elegant, unbothered, singular, everything she wants to be.

Just down the road, her sister Vicki listens at the bedroom door of seventeen-year-old daughter Gretel, and is shocked to overhear her telling a friend about the mechanics of giving a blowjob. As Vicki goes about her days—exercising, arguing, working at the beauty salon she owns, listening to true crime podcasts that she imagines she's a guest star on—Vicki can feel a terror building in her bones. Something very bad is going to happen, and probably to Gretel.

It's summer holidays in suburban Australia—stinking hot, the sound of tennis and cricket on telly, the threat of bushfires, long and chaotic family dinners, first dates. As the bushfires move in on them, the power goes out all over town and Vicki's worst fears are realised: Gretel is missing, and Susan finally grasps how the dildo can help her.

Original, comedic, and warmly told, *No One's Looking* will make you giggle and cry. It cuts to the bone of relationships, of misogyny, of anxiety, of fear, of family and of love.





The World Beneath Her Feet






Broome 2023: When Saskia's free-spirited mother leaves her a caravan in her will, it doesn't make sense. Saskia is a schoolteacher, tied to plans and schedules, even if they are beginning to feel restrictive. Then she finds clues in the van about her mother's mysterious past, setting her on a journey to Tasmania with her young daughter Anouk, who shares her late grandmother's fascination with birds.

In 1968, teenager Greta De Winter seeks solace in the Stanley wetlands, a swamp that attracts all manner of wildlife. Her father is the local councillor and her mother a taxidermist, working to create bird dioramas for the Tasmanian Museum and Art Gallery. But while the De Winter household seems harmless from the outside, a dark secret hides within.

When Saskia and Anouk arrive in Stanley, they search for the missing pieces to the puzzle of Greta's tragic childhood. In the process of uncovering her family history, Saskia realises that her mother's final act might also enable her to rediscover who she really is, and what she is truly capable of.

Set in the breathtaking landscape of Tasmania's majestic north-west, this is a moving and highly evocative novel of family bonds and betrayals, by the bestselling author of *The Secrets of the Huon Wren*.

CLARE VAN RYN is an awarded writer who began her career as a newspaper journalist, but has also filled roles as magazine editor, communications specialist, writing teacher, blueberry picker and shoe fitter. 
On a quiet night in 1972, two girls each make a choice...


A Language of Limbs offers an intimate portrait of queer bodies, art, heartbreak, joy and the unseen connections that bind us.

Love Overdue


Nobody knows better than Lauren Green that dating a student's dad is totally off limits. Too bad love isn't always by the book!





Mo, notoriously private, is desperate to keep the diary's dark contents hidden from the tabloids and well away from his beloved younger brother, and he's willing to pay Netta handsomely to personally return it to him in London. The financial reward would mean Netta could keep her apartment and try assisted conception treatments; after all, the clock's ticking. Loudly. But she can't go. After what happened there 20 years ago, she vowed never to return to London. Not for anything.

When necessity bites, Netta reluctantly accepts Mo's offer and life quickly becomes even more complicated. There's paparazzi to contend with, a fake date that feels all-too-real and a Christmas Day confession that changes everything.

Amongst the chaos, Netta and Mo forge a rare connection, and discover that facing up to the past might be the only way to find the real thing. Or maybe something even better.





Your oldest and dearest friends know you best and forgive you the most...or do they?

Bestselling author Marnie Elliott is about to be exposed. 

A murder investigation and 'amour impossible' between enemies shake a nobleman's estate in wartime Russia

June 1812. Napoleon's invincible army crosses the Neman River into Russia, forcing Russian troops to hastily retreat. While Napoleon awaits Tsar Alexander's response before advancing his campaign, French regiments stop to rest and refuel, taking over village homes and surrounding estates. Nobleman Lipetsky, his wife and their 17-year old daughter Edoxie must share their manor house with French Major de Briac and his military surgeon, keeping a tense diplomatic ceasefire.

Soon after the soldiers' arrival, a terrible series of events unfolds: serf girls are found strangled, floating in the river. With the country at war, an official investigation is impossible. Edoxie and the French Major both feel morally compelled to find out who is killing the serf girls, and together embark on their own investigation.

As the list of suspects grows, neighboring landowners whom Edoxie has known her entire life can no longer be trusted. Horror creeps into the very walls of their home, transforming those closest to them into frightening strangers.

Set in the same period as Tolstoy's *War & Peace*, the reader is plunged into life on a vast estate where murder changes the fate of soldiers, serfs and a noble family.



DARIA DESOMBRE was born in Saint Petersburg where she studied at the Hermitage Art School and received a Masters in English and Spanish from Saint Petersburg's State University. In 2000 she moved to Paris and completed a MBA in fashion marketing and management. The letters move from the intensely personal—stories of motherhood, grief, faith, and survival—to the political, as their respective organisations demand to include women's voices in peacemaking.



A Land for All

Two States. One Homeland.

A candid dialogue between a Palestinian politicial activist and an Israeli journalist results in a radical, new vision for co-existence.

October 7th 2023 opened the darkest chapter in the history of relations between Israelis and Palestinians since 1948. Now more than ever, maintaining the status quo seems both impossible and dangerous. In recent weeks, more countries have recognised Palestine and the international community repeatedly calls for a two-state solution. But is a return to the classical two-state model possible after its failings in the last thirty years, and can it regain the trust of Israelis and Palestinians, after years of mistrust and bloodshed? Is there a fairer model?

Through the friendship and sustained correspondence between Meron Rapoport and Awni Al-Mashni, *A Land for All* zooms in on the current pivotal moment in the history of the conflict. They claim that the logic of separation, walls and siege that underpins the two-state solution has led us to today's tragic point. They propose to replace it with a logic of coexistence and the vision of a shared homeland: a home to two independent states on the 1967 borders within a confederation, with equal civil and national rights and open borders. A land for all.

In a time governed by hate and mutual destruction, such dialogue and thinking out-of-the-box offers a rare glimmer of hope.



AWNI AL-MASHNI is a political activist, member of the consulting council for Fatah. He was candidate for the Palestinian parliamentary elections that were supposed to take place in 2021. He is one of the founders of Multaka Falastin, a political and cultural forum uniting Palestinians from around the world. He is a columnist for Ma'an, Middle East Eye and other Arab and Hebrew news outlets.





Women Write the Night

A unique collection of women's writing about night, darkness and sleeplessness, revealing how the nocturnal hours have always been a place for female adventure, creativity, radical spirituality and freedom.

For centuries, night has been Man Land, a place for men to adventure, misbehave, and experience extreme creativity. From Galileo and the earliest astronomers, to artists like Picasso, Van Gogh, Kafka and Proust, night is associated with the imaginative brilliance and bravery of men. But for women, night was a place of danger. A time when a woman was only safe with a male protector. A time when women out after dark were thought to be witches or prostitutes – and punished accordingly.

And yet this was not so. Abbs's research shows that women have always lived a rich life under the cover of darkness. Night was often the only time when women could grab time for themselves. Moreover, higher rates of insomnia meant that many women spent long periods awake during the night. Others were awake nursing the sick, young and elderly. Some women sought out nature, adventure and excitement at night but kept it largely to themselves. Women have always experienced night differently from their male counterparts, as made evident in their writings.

The first of its kind, *Women Write the Night* chronicles women's complex and nuanced nocturnal lives, both today and far into our past. Including extracts from letters, diaries and novels, as well as eight original essays, this rich collection reveals that, far from sleeping safely in their beds, women were awake, often working, walking, studying, creating, examining the night sky, or merely reflecting and thinking.



ANNABEL ABBS grew up in Bristol, Sussex and Wales before studying English literature at the University of East Anglia and Marketing at the University of Kingston. She has written five non-fiction works including The Age-Well Project (Piatkus), Windswept: Why Women Walk (John Murray), 52 Ways to Walk (Bloomsbury), Sleepless (John Murray) and the Walking Cure (Bloomsbury). She is also the author of three novels translated in 18 languages: The Joyce Girl (Impress Books), Frieda: The Original Lady Chatterley (Hachette UK & ANZ) and A Language of Food/Miss Eliza's English Kitchen (S&S UK & William Morrow US).
